
ADRIENNE BRUNTON

I am a Bespoke Clothing and Mixed Media artist.







My passion and total ethos for my practice is to create with mainly found and thrifted fabrics, notions and anything I need for my work. I use fabrics as my main source but love to work with teabags and coffee stained doilies, tablecloths and crochet tablecloths, buttons, zips, paints and so much more.

After making the most of small spaces, the edge of my bedroom, a mini office, spare bedroom and more over the years I have finally sold the TV and couch to create a lovely French Inspired studio where I spend every spare moment I have.

I only create OOAK (one of a kind), special, interesting and unique pieces. I can achieve this all because I thrift and upcycle quality preloved pieces of clothing and textiles. My happy place is Op Shopping (opportunity, thrifting) or at home designing something to share or sell. There are many hours spent collecting enough treasures before I can even contemplate starting a project... but totally worth the journey.

I make what the fabrics and trims feed my imagination. What the end product becomes is what I find in my extensive stash of mediums. Therefore each piece is very individual and bespoke. Some creations are completed in a seamless process and others take months to be finished. Its all about the process that excites me and feeds my soul.













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I feel my clothing is for the wearer to feel empowered and confident, to love the story of the garment, the creation and bespoke design.

As for my mixed media, this comes in many different forms but currently I am working on books or albums made from old book covers, fabric pages and lots of notions or slow stitching which I find relaxing and enjoyable.

One I am currently working on, the cover is an old needlecraft book which I stained with walnut ink. I have then coffee dyed some old laces, trims and doilies and old tea towels to create the signatures to go inside. Each signature has 3 leaves so 6 pages. I have 4 signatures which will be filled to complete the album. This album is soley about antique sewing notions, decorative stiches and embellishments.




DAWN EDWARDS

I live in Southwest Michigan, just a short drive from beautiful Lake Michigan. We have four distinct seasons which provides for an ever-changing source of inspiration found in nature.

My favorite felt items to create are sculptural hats and vessels.





I find great joy in looking at items found in nature, whether that be flowers, shells, leaves, pinecones, and recreating a version of them in felt. I liken many of my felt hats to small sculptures, and find that they are actually quite wearable and fun to be worn, too.

You might think that tree fungus would be an odd thing to recreate in felt as a hat, but take a look at the hat shown on the next page, and you may nod your head in agreement with Van Gogh's quote, "If you truly love nature, you will find beauty everywhere." I love that through feltmaking, we are able to look at things in different ways and find beauty in the unexpected. This has been a gift to me.

I've heard it said that, "If you do what you love, you'll never work a day in your life.", and I have found this to be very true in feltmaking and I am thankful for this opportunity.

RENEE HUNT




A little known fact about me is that I have goat hoof print tattoos up one leg.

BEFORE ...





HERE ARE SOME TIPS FOR RE-UPHOLSTERING A COUCH

Here are some tips if you are thinking about reupholstering a couch for yourself...

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1. Start by carefully removing the existing upholstery. Use a seam ripper or small scissors to avoid damaging the fabric underneath.

2. Take detailed measurements of each piece of fabric you remove. This will help you determine how much new fabric you'll need.

3. Inspect the couch frame for any damage or loose joints. Repair or reinforce these areas before proceeding with the re-upholstering process.

4. Choose a durable and high-quality fabric that suits your style and the intended use of the couch. Consider factors like color, pattern, and texture.

5. Pre-wash or pre-shrink the fabric before cutting and sewing it. This will prevent any unwanted shrinking or color bleeding after the re-upholstering is complete.



6. Use a heavy-duty sewing machine and upholstery-grade thread to ensure strong and secure seams. Reinforce stress points with double stitching.

7. Consider adding extra padding or foam to areas that may need more support or comfort. This can enhance the overall feel of the re-upholstered couch.

8. Take your time when stretching and attaching the new fabric to the couch frame. Smooth out any wrinkles or creases to achieve a professional finish.


9. Use a staple gun or upholstery tacks to secure the fabric to the frame. Start from the center and work your way outwards, pulling the fabric taut as you go.

10. Finally, trim any excess fabric and neatly finish the edges with decorative trim or piping for a polished look.

Remember, re-upholstering a couch can be a challenging task, so don't hesitate to seek professional help if needed. Good luck with your project!

HERE ARE SOME TIPS FOR RE-COVERING A LAMPSHADE

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Here are ten top tips for recovering a lampshade:

1. Choose the right fabric: Select a fabric that complements the style and color scheme of your room. Consider the durability and light-transmitting properties of the fabric as well.

2. Measure the lampshade: Take accurate measurements of the height, top diameter, and bottom diameter of the lampshade to ensure you get the right amount of fabric.

3. Remove the old fabric: Carefully detach the existing fabric from the lampshade frame. You may need to use a seam ripper or scissors to carefully cut the stitches or glue holding it in place.

4. Clean the frame: Before attaching the new fabric, clean the lampshade frame to remove any dust or debris. You can use a soft cloth or a mild cleaning solution if necessary.



5. Prepare the new fabric: Lay out the new fabric and iron out any wrinkles or creases. This will make it easier to work with and ensure a smooth finish.

6. Cut the fabric: Use the measurements you took earlier to cut the new fabric to the appropriate size. Leave a little extra fabric on each side to allow for folding and attaching.

7. Attach the fabric: Apply fabric glue or use a hot glue gun to secure the fabric to the lampshade frame. Start at the seam and work your way around, smoothing out any wrinkles as you go.

8. Fold and trim excess fabric: Fold the excess fabric over the top and bottom edges of the lampshade frame, securing it with glue. Trim any excess fabric to create a neat and tidy finish.

9. Add decorative elements: If desired, you can embellish the lampshade with trims, ribbons, or other decorative elements. This can add a personal touch and enhance the overall look of the lampshade.



10. Allow it to dry: Once you've finished attaching the fabric and any additional decorations, allow the lampshade to dry completely before placing it back on the lamp.

You might experience challenges with getting the stitching tight and even so the lampshade does not end up with odd bumps that look strange.

How do you get the cut of the curve of each panel to fit just right when re-covering shaped lampshades?

Here are some ideas that you could try...

Cut the fabric on the bias not the straight grain.

Wrap in scraps and then drape and pin one panel at a time.

Work with fabric pieces that are larger than the panel that you want to make so you have room to shift and adjust as you work.

I hope these tips help you successfully recover your lampshade!


