








ANITA GIELEN-SLOESEN

About me...I am 63 years young. Born in a little village in the Netherlands,married with Aad. We have two daughters, 5 grandsons and 2 granddaughters,two horses and three cats and live now in Germany for 17 years. I have worked for many years as a pharmacy assistent in a pharmacy and later in a general practice. When I was 6,my mom learned me knitting and crochet,and I made clothes for my dolls.My mom sew it together.I had always ideas, sometimes I made some together with my dad.









When I was 18, I took a sewing course with my sister. Only for 2 months, we did not learn anything at all... Then I learned it myself...with many ups and downs. But I learned a lot from the downs....I have made a lot and sold it or give it away as a gift. In 2018 a horse was ill, the vet made the wrong diagnose and in the evening he died when I was with him. My heart cried... That was the beginning of these projects, I started with a bear....and then followed more and more. I make them of old sheets, tablecloths, clothes and then I paint them, that takes many hours. But that doesn't matter....that's hobby! When the process is growing and growing then I see what a character it becomes. Make the clothes ,and then I can't wait no longer and want to finish it. For example, I create bowls and body's from old newspapers and egg cartons, also low budget, and recycling materials. My husband asked me often when do you sell it? Then I say: when I am old.

They called me 'Olive Oil' when I was young (as in Popeye and Olive Oil cartoon), because I was rail thin. We lived in a tiny, remote town in the American Midwest with little (none actually) access to retail stores so my clothing came from yard sales, hand-me-downs, and mail order catalogues. As a result, with the help of my Aunt, I learned to sew at an early age so I could alter clothing to fit my thin frame. Upcycling was a necessity from an early age and continued to be an asset through most of my life. It only became a hobby after I retired.




I remember with humor some of my early sewing projects. We had a Singer treadle sewing machine where my first attempt ending in sewing through a finger. I once made a one-piece pajama jumper with raglan sleeves. I accidentally sewed the leg piece where the arm was supposed to go. Instead of tearing it out, I adjusted the leg to become an arm, and shortened the correct leg to match the errant arm (now

a leg). Upcycling was in my DNA.

Artistic expression was the other constant in my life. I studied art in college, primarily oil and acrylic painting. It also wasn't until I retired that I combined sewing with art in an art form called 'Fabric Collage' or 'painting with fabrics'. I have created many art pieces using only fabric pieces and thread.





We live in the Pacific Northwest, Gig
Harbor, Washington – a beautiful area of
trees, water, and mild climate located on
Puget Sound, a large water area that
connects with the Pacific Ocean. I have 3
cats, 1 dog, and a husband. My cats like to
keep me company when I sew, whether I
want them to or not.



My granddaughter and her cat also live with us, and she is an accomplished seamstress as well. We have accumulated a lot of sewing machines – sergers, embroidery machines, freemotion longarm, and an industrial machine that can sew through ½" of leather like butter. I have 3 mannequins that scare the wits out of visitors when they accidentally stumble upon them. I love denim and wool – and those are my main thrift store goals.

My favorite projects are transforming them into totes, purses, or hats. I create my own patterns. We are fortunate to be able to sell them online, at gift shows, and in local boutiques (or I'd have a house full of projects!)

I say "true northern" because we are 5 hours above what others consider to be the North: San Francisco. 5 hours away from urban resources, so we excel at fending for ourselves - a tradition instilled in me by my mother's side of the family. "If you can't make it, do you really need it?"







Sewing, Art, and Science have always been a big part of my life. I really can't separate them, for they are all a form of creation based on curiosity, skill, exploration, discovery, failure and perserverance. I was fortunate enough to bring these three together via a very random path. I grew up sewing, studied art as an undergraduate, and was then invited to be a visiting artist in at MIT (Massachussetts Institute of Technology,) graduating with a Masters Degree in Art and Technology. Upon graduation, my husband and I made the radical decision to move to Shasta, 40 years ago. 40 years of wonderful discovery. No more ready access to anything I wanted. Learning, once again, to make it myself. Meeting successful, likeminded artists with boundless curiosity. Raising two amazing sons with my musician husband, and rescuing endless numbers of cats. All of this has fed my creativity more than anything I can remember.







My work is diverse, but it always contains a recycling element. I make my print papers and dress forms from my junk mail. My embroidered prints use thrown out fabrics. Repurposed and upcycled papers, waste, and fabrics form the base of my clothing. And now, I am obsessed with creating jewelry from thread scraps left over from sewing classes. I leave jars around the classroom for students to put their clippings in, telling them that it's just like building sand paintings in jars. With these threads, I build a sculptured necklace - never having an idea what it will be - just following the threads as I embroider. Oftentimes, these jewelry sculptures lead to a complimentary piece of clothing.



HELEN OAKEY

My name is Helen aka 'Eclectic Minx' and I am a textile artist based in Yorkshire, England. I create one-off soft sculptures, mainly of birds and art dolls, from reclaimed and vintage materials. I also love to produce muted, subtle coloured fabrics using botanical dyes, sourced from my own garden and local surroundings.

Although my background is in graphic design, my passion has always been for textiles. From an early age, I always loved making things with my hands, especially sewing, and delighted in rummaging through fabric offcuts given to me by my mum's dressmaker friend, which I stored in an old vintage suitcase.





My mum and my auntie were both creative with textiles; knitting, crocheting and sewing. Both were from the 'make do and mend' generation, when people were far less wasteful, something that I now realise, as well as being central to my work ethic, also provides a comforting sense of nostalgia, connecting my past to my present.

Reclaimed fabric appeals to me because as well as the obvious environmental benefits of not buying new, it has a history and so much more personality, be it a stained, yellowing vintage tablecloth with damaged lace edging, a bejewelled evening dress or a pair of heavy velvet curtains that have nested for years in an attic. Each piece takes many hours to make and is unique due to the nature of the materials used. I make similar birds for example, but no two are ever exactly the same. Each has its own personality.







JACQUI FUNK



JANE BARNETT



JANE BLAKE





I love to create beautiful one of a kind fashion from second hand fabric and "waste" material that would have otherwise ended up in landfill. I have a custom upcycling service which allows people to send me their preloved clothing for me to rework into something new and unique, helping people fall back in love with their clothes while also preventing them from being thrown away. Everything I sew is done on my grandmothers vintage sewing machine, and with secondhand materials. I save all of my scrap material to try to keep my studio as "zero waste" as I possibly can.



These scrap materials go into patchworks and get made into stuffing material for quilted pieces like bags and jackets. I offer a made to order service for my custom designs which include hoodies, jackets and denim jeans. I also recently showed my first upcycled collection at Swansea Fashion Week which was a lot of fun to do a runway and show my work. My love of upcycling stems from my love of nature and the environment and a desire to protect it. If I am not sewing in my studio, I am probably surfing or swimming in the sea with my husband and my dog Pippa."


















SUSANN NILSEN

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

KATHY QUALLS

This photo was taken on a mission we did, in Guatemala. Most of the time, I am the photographer. My husband and I do mission work (prosthetics, installing clean burning stoves, providing water filters and currently, working to complete a medical center!) in rural Guatemala. We have seen people making do, mending, etc and it really is inspiring. The more I personally mend and make do, the more our money can go toward giving others what they need, like clean water and health care. Further, I am able to make some items to sell to help fund these missions.

I am going to teach you how to make fabric bowl covers.

BOWL COVERS: *Choose 1 fabric (lining) that is moisture resistant (like windbreakers, umbrella nylon, tablecloths, etc). *Choose 1 fabric that is cotton/cotton blend that has been prewashed (like shirts, skirts, etc). *Elastic ¼" to ½" Cut a circle from each fabric. If doing it for a particular bowl, cut it about 2-½ inches larger than the circumference of the bowl.





With right sides together, sew around the circle, leaving an opening large enough to right side out and insert elastic. This is sewn with about ½" seam allowance.







Sew the casing (all the way around) about $\frac{1}{2}$ " to $\frac{3}{4}$ " from edge, depending on what elastic you are using. Better a little wider than needed, so you don't end up fighting getting elastic in the casing.

Insert elastic into the casing you made and sew together.



Pin the opening and sew closed. I use a narrow zigzag, but straight stitch is fine. I have found it easiest to work from the inside, to make sure the stitching connects both layers in such a small work area.







And you are done!

FYI- I have been making these for a few years now and they are very well received as a gift that will actually be used. Saves money spent on plastic wraps, etc and far better for the environment. Toss into normal laundry between uses.

Learn from A. Laura Brody and Dreams by Machine! Ms. Brody has 30+ years experience in costume and textile making and design. Her approach to teaching makes it enjoyable, accessible, and encouraging. FabMo is an volunteer-run non-profit that started when an environmentally-conscious couple learned how much fabric mostly various-sized upholstery and drapery samples - was discarded every week at the San Francisco Design Center. They arranged to go up to San Francisco from their home in the South Bay to pick up these garbage bags of unwanted samples from various studios. That grew as more and more firms learned that they could save money by donating these materials instead of having them hauled away as trash. Word spread and they began to be offered mill-ends and fabrics still on the roll, wallpaper & tile samples, cones of thread, yarn stashes and various other craft supplies. Where does all this go? It goes to sewists, quilters, paper-crafters, mixed-media artists, school teachers, needleworkers, costumers - you name it! - through a regular schedule of 3-day sale events where you can buy supplies at pennies on the dollar. FabMo also has an online store where some of the most intriguing fabrics, yarns, etc. are offered first, though you must live close enough to the warehouse in Sunnyvale, CA, to pick up your purchases (or have a friend who can do it for you.) It's a wonderful group of people, and a fun and fascinating place to volunteer.

They collaborate with the local garbage collection/ recycling company, the school district & many other organizations.

They have monthly giveaways to teachers, & they offer inexpensive/free workshops. Info below.

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


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




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
