




MELANIE'S CLOSET







It was tough to choose one and we would like to thank Claudia Sander for her contribution that received the most votes in our poll. You will see more of the submissions in the Member Features.






CAROLE LAMBERT LAFLEUR

A bit about myself:

My first long-term career was as a professional hairstylist.. I also was a member of local and provincial advisory boards and marker when students took their practical exams to become licensed beauticians. I started working in a salon when I was 13. I loved the creativity and the ever changing nature of the beauty industry.






My Norwegian grandmother, my mother and my aunts all knitted, crocheted, sewed and embroidered. My mother taught me to knit when I was very young.

My second long term career was as in the Mental Health and Addictions Field. I worked as a counsellor, life skills coach and workshop facilitator. Every week, when I worked at a recovery house for women, one group session was devoted to creativity. For many of the women it was their first attempt at exploring their creative nature.

Myself and other staff taught the women how to knit and crochet. For Christmas project, we knitted and crocheted squares, staff member sewed them together and blankets donated to local charities like women's shelters, Cancer wards at hospitals.







I have thrift shopped most of my adult life. I started seriously up cycling about 20 years -making bags from jeans, then making fabric bags, lined, hand sewn. Then wearable art up cycled jeans and jackets, hats, cufflets (bracelets). Also fabric art on canvas (16x20 ins) and wall hangings: fabric, doilies, lace, notions (all recycled materials)

I do also still enjoy knitting and crocheting (recently made dishcloths for a fundraiser for Ukraine) and beading. I love combining different textures and mediums in my pieces.

I do, at times, sell my creations at local markets and now on FB marketplace sites. I'm currently working on making a coat from a Jean jacket. I love the inspiration and motivation I receive from the Upcycle Cloth Collective group and other up cycling groups. Happy Creating!!






CLAUDIA SANDER

I'm Claudia from Germany, art educator and Head of an after school care center. My English is far from perfect, so please excuse me if my diction might seem a bit peculiar!

I live in a rural region between Frankfurt and Heidelberg called "Odenwald", surrounded by beautiful nature. Since I was a child, I'm constantly interested in crafts. My range has increased in volume the older I got, and I've experienced a lot of different techniques like drawing, painting, sculpting, paper crafts, textile crafts, all sorts of handicraft and some more.





For over 30 years, one of my main interests has been doing mosaics; for 6 years now I have started to create a very special kind of this, namely mosaic in sardine tins.

But besides that, especially in the colder months, I love to sew. As I hate shopping and prefer any kind of upcycling by the way, I use mostly used fabrics or small pieces of for example upholstering fabric from pattern books for what I create.

And I really love to sew with paper, especially wallpaper! I have collected over 30 wallpaper pattern books, saved from the landfill.





As you can imagine, I have loads of materials of all kinds in my studio and in the basement. But that's what I need: A huge variety of everything, from vintage china for my mosaics to boxes full of felted woolen sweaters and all in between! And all of this belongs together, has something in common: The multicolouredness, the playfulness and the aspect of upcycling.





DIANE SMITH

I decided to keep a fabric diary for the year July 1, 2023 - June 30, 2024.

I used a piece of old pillowcase for my backing fabric. I divided it into 12 sectionsone for each month - with basting threads. For each day, I select an icon - just a little picture - to represent something that happened that day. A house with an initial when the kids come to visit or my dog when she's not feeling well. I design the icon and embroider it. Most of my embroidery silks are second or even third hand. If nothing stands out, I use a flower.







I add red hearts or French knots to fill in any spaces I don't like. I usually do a week's worth of embroidery at a time.









HILARY MC COOL

Well it was lock down wasn't it and what was I going to do that would keep me out of mischief, no trying to subvert the Internet or theatre workshops for me. So as I had been playing about with denim and I have some millinery skills I decided to make a top hat. Then I decided to make a coat. Silly me.

Anyway everything you do presents a problem and one which must be resolved using the scope of criteria you set.



Mine were that I did not want to have any top stitching and the coat had to be made with no traditional seams, in other words no flat pattern. So it was literally built on the form, you could call it drape, but this was not, this was building, brick by denim brick.

It is, like the topper a work in progress, I haven't resolved the armhole and it will be lined and heavily decorated.

But I digress, the hat. This was shaped and then denim stretched over the form. Each piece of denim had to be stitched into place, the form wired and then embroidered. Then I had to repeat the process on the underside while securing the brim in place.





I work organically so while my ideas started with Sashiko I moved into a mix of more traditional forms and an exploration of maps, which I have carried into other work. The mix of needlework traditions seems to suit the work, and my particular approach to things, and I am by no means an expert. I happen to like the imperfection.


Like I said silly me I did not realize how many challenges would present themselves.

This is the unusual thing I have sewn













JACKIE BELL JOHNSON

No sewing in this project, (unlike some of my others), but salvaging/recycling/reusing material, and critique of climate change and consumerism are themes that run through my entire art practice.







Hi there fellow crafter's, My name is Karen and I live with my grumpy old Jack Russell in a small Village in the Shropshire Hills in England.



I first got into crafting and sewing when I was around 10 years of age after my Brother bought me my first old Singer hand sewing machine. I started with rabbits and teddies for friends and then when I was older I got into making my own clothes. Then work and life got in the way like having three children and so for a long while in fact many years I never got around to making anything.

But as you all know you can't keep a good crafter down for long, so a few years ago I got so angry with all the plastic bags being sold in every shop that I started collecting any fabric I could find to turn into shopping bags, I designed them to have wider handles so they would not cut into your fingers and all have linings and are washable so will last for years.









I started giving them away to family and friends in the Village, then went onto doing fete's/fairs to sell for charity. To date I'm sure I have made over 500 plus and still cutting them out and making them.

That is how my up-cycling journey began, but now I make many more things from the scraps left over, I started these little pictures, which are now framed, little houses which are then turned into other things along the way.

My business has been running for over five years now and as well as reducing textile waste and upcycling fabrics into usable items I also try to spread the love of upcycling and educate others in the process. I have held several webinars on sustainable sewing, talking about the textile industry and different techniques that can be used in upcycling fabrics too.

I stumbled into the world of events after leaving University where I had been studying Contemporary Lens Media, the need of a job and an interesting opportunity set my career path...

ITTLE CREATIONS



In 2012 I had the opportunity to volunteer at a Community Festival, I was asked to become the Production Crew Manager, recruiting, organizing and managing 400 volunteers on site. This was a massive opportunity for me to develop my skills and to explore the world of Festivals but the company I was employed with at the time refused to give me the required time off So, I quit!

My Mum thought I was mad, leaving a secure job to go and 'prance around' in a field for two weeks, and it was a scary jump, I had been in full-time employment since finishing my education, but I knew it was what I needed to do to progress and grow my own skills. It was the best decision I ever made!






I have since travelled the world working on large scale live events for a multitude of Corporate Companies and I spend my Summers working on Festival sites in Management and Creative roles.

Working for myself encouraged me to explore different interests, I have the time to potter in my garden and flex my not-so-green fingers in my greenhouse, I design and make crocheted items (available in my shop here).

I spend much more time having random adventures with my partner Josh and our super grumpy Ginger Tom cat and, of course I have been able to focus my passion for up-cycling, creating and educating by creating and building up Little reCreations.







One thing I have NEVER understood about festival goers is how they can enjoy the beautiful landscapes and iconic countryside for the duration of the festival – then leave such a wasteful mess behind them when they leave. It baffles me how anyone could happily abandon the refuse from their whole weekend, including perfectly good tents and camping equipment.

After walking miles around different festival sites staring in horror at the apocalyptic scenes first hand, I knew I had to be part of the solution to clear up our countryside and prevent tons of perfectly good equipment going to landfill.

I began by speaking to my industry contacts to see whether anyone else was feeling similarly outraged at the wasteful attitude of the average festival goer, and happily discovered that I was not alone.



HAVE YOU EVER EXPERIENCED THIS AT AN EVENT?



In 2016, I joined the Festival Waste Reclamation & Distribution group and spent an afternoon walking through campsites at Boomtown Fair, helping various charities to collect any items that could be passed on to people needing a helping hand. These items included brand new tents, chairs, sleeping bags, pillows, torches, sunglasses, hats, clothing, and food.

FWRD do an incredible job by linking up festivals to a huge range of different charities and not-for-profits around the country, and managing the salvage operations for different festival sites. It was at this first salvage that I met Angus and Mark from Herts for Refugees, an amazing charity who ensure that refugees get the help and respect they deserve.






Whilst walking around the sites, I noticed that while many of the tents were damaged and un-usable, the fabric was fabulous! The colours were bright and some of the patterns were absolutely stunning – surely there was something I could do with that? So I started collecting them. I had no idea what I was going to do with the material at all, but in just four hours I had collected three bin bags full of beautiful, colourful fabric... and that was only from one field!!!

My other half thought I was crazy when I returned home with my van full of "rubbish" and rolled his eyes in that supportive yet uncertain way, but it didn't deter me and I got straight down to washing everything thoroughly before cutting it into strips with my pinking shears.



After a little help from my friends, bribed with good food and beer we created the first few meters of <u>Tent Tinsel</u>, and it looked amazing.

My imagination and ideas have continued to grow... as has Little reCreations - with an ever-growing range of products and many more ideas being developed, I now sell a range of Sustainable upcycled accessories and hire my fresh up-cycled decorations back to the festivals they originally came from, often to decorate their campsites (how ironic!).






I am still very much involved in helping <u>FWRD</u> at festivals, in particular <u>Herts for Refugees</u>.

I still enjoy pottering around campsites with my scissors alongside Angus and Mark (plus any other friends I manage to drag along) stripping down the broken tents and reducing (strip by strip) the amount of waste that unfortunately still ends up in landfill.

As well as funding my own creative initiative, I am also passionate about continuing to support all the charities doing incredible work redistributing festival site 'junk' to people who really need it.

That is why 10% of all profits from <u>Little</u> reCreations up-cycled decorations are donated to a selected charity each year.







LIODA FREITAG

Hello Everyone. My name is Lioda and I originally come from South Africa, but moved to France about two and a half years ago looking for new and exciting opportunities for my Chef Husband and my artist self.

Needless to say it was hard people! French bureaucracy is real. But it is also a society that values in the more rural areas, re-use of all kinds of things. Thus the "Brocantes" were formed... Antique roadshow eat your heart out. This is a country of heaven for antique dealers and seekers of secondhand treasures.



As a little girl, my Ouma was an avid sewer and she never went out of the house without a hand sewn dress and a coat to match. I still have one of her coats, and I think its between 50-100 years old now, and still in perfect condition. She also sewed all of my dancing costumes and often I sat with her not really seeing what she was doing, but something somehow took hold.

At 14 my mom and Aunt Clubbed together and bought me my first sewing machine and 2 patterns and 2 pieces of cloth. I even still have a picture of the first garment I made. Well, I've been sewing small things on and off since then.

But after coming to France, I got bitten by a up scale bug and the bite became quite itchy in a big dream to have my own little creative handmade or up scaled items store.






And its about to become a temporary reality as I now have an opportunity to create a pop-up store in Sille le Guilaume in Sarthe at a friend of mines store. She has graciously given me permission to utilize some space there and sit and do my thing! After all the paperwork etc, next week is D day and I'm terrified no one likes what Ives spent the last two and a half years doing! So anyway, I love going to grenier "empty attic" stores to search for interesting fabrics and sewing treasures. As I also make jewelry from dried flowers I hand pick and clay and resin works, those things too are searched for.

This brings us to the little bag showcased today. The cloth was a small round cloth found at a grenier shop and was antique and made from cotton and linen weave. I loved the cheerful yellow on it, but it was very quiet and contained as a design that pleased me to no end.






I first made a zero waste jacket with the brightest of yellow binding I could find, sewn on meticulously by hand so as not to show sewing thread lines and then seeing enough left over, I thought why not a bag to match!?

Not really having made many bags before, I had to watch quite a few bag making videos and books online to get the idea that I wanted. I had only crafted a few small back-packs before, so this was new.

The perfect structure pattern came up and I could see the final items in my minds eye. After careful cutting and sewing with my lovely vintage singer machine, I knew it needed something else to it. Straps were not the issue, but I want a wow factor to it. A French friend had given me a whole two bags of thrift items from a house he had bought that was full of unwanted sewing items.





So I dove straight into that and saw amongst all the very musty things vintage hand crafted macramé or structured lace tie ups, although a bit tattered and torn, but quite astoundingly beautiful.

I had to repair them by hand, finding the closest cotton, to create one that seemed perfect to go with the colour and the natural look of the bag. And it found it's WOW factor.

I then felt to set the bag off against the Jacket, a bit of embellished handembroidery would round it off perfectly. And around the centre of some of the flowers, I elected silky DMC treads in a matching brown and a matt yellow DCM Thread for the yellow. It took a while, but I think it will certainly make a treasured one of a kind gift for a special lady in someone's life.



PHILLIPA CROCKER SEAHORSE DRESS

My name is Phillipa Crocker. I'm 3/4 of a century in age. My home is in the Bay of Plenty Whakatane New Zealand. My husband Gordon and I are both retired and enjoying doing a house renovation and revamping the old garden.

Sewing is one of my passions. I learned skills from my mum and grandmother starting age 10. I love to repurpose clothes purchased at charity shops.

My Seahorse dress featured here was a wonderful mission.





The base dress ready-made was really a little small for me. With a gusset set in on both side seams and removing set in sleeves, I started creating my Seahorse on a piece of strong upholstery fabric.

Starting at the tail first, up and just created as I went. Adding lace, silk threads under tulle, to hold the silk in. It totally evolved from tail to head. Stopping to hand stitch beads and pearls. All done by the sewing machine.





This costume was made for myself to wear, to a yearly event, a mixture of Cosplay and Steampunk enthusiasts. My hat had the Steampunk look!

After all, that's my 'hobby ' you could call it. I suffered permanent Vertigo, so walk with a walking stick to help keep me upright. This happened 6 years ago, a medical misadventure with the wrong medication.



So sewing is a sit-down blessing for me. In 1976 my kidneys were failing. Then in 2018 I received a new kidney, a live donation from my husband Gordon. After doing Chemo and Dialysis for 11 months this is certainly become our 'Miracle'. He has given me a few more years of life, in fact so far it's been 5 years. We were a 98% match enough for it to happen. I have worn the dress on 2 occasions so far. I may wear it again in the Christmas parade.

TANIA KRISTENSON

Greetings from the Canadian Prairie! I am Tania Kristensen, fibre artist and the creative soul behind Studio TK. I bring into being art and home decor made with nature's bounty and man's unwanted textiles.

I have a deep-seated attraction to the past. Particularly how things were done before there were machines. When we relied upon our hands and simple tools to help produce the things that would provide us with comfort and survival.







Along with a strong belief in 'Waste Not, Want Not', I feel the skills and techniques developed by our ancestors to be invaluable and in such has become the basis of my work.

When I stumbled across contemporary twined rugs a few years ago, I instantly thought the craft to be the best of both worlds. A technique that predates written history and employs discarded cloth. It was a perfect fit. Exactly what I was looking for.

The only tools needed to make a twined rug, are a simple frame loom and your hands. The weaving technique consists of two alternating wefts being twisted around a single warp and repeated. With single and double weft twists different patterns can be created.

The design possibilities are endless.







I use nothing but discarded cloth in the construction of my rugs. Breathing life back into a once cherished tablecloth or a favourite t-shirt, brings me nothing less than pure joy.

Basketry is my other creative outlet. I've coiled up everything from cattails to pine needles and of course unwanted textiles. A current project I'm slowly working on, is creating thread from stinging nettle fibre to stitch a pine needle basket with. It's a time consuming project.

It began with harvesting the stinging nettles and pine needles, to extracting and processing the nettle fibres and cleaning and grading the pine needles. I have now finally started to twist up the miles of thread I will need to stitch the basket up with.





I'm finding the process to be extremely rewarding. Both artistically and on a deeper personal level. I feel an appreciation and a small connection to those who came before us. It truly and completely makes my heart sing.

I look forward to continuing to share my art and creative experiences with you all. I have a short series of basic twining tutorials on YouTube, for any of you that are interested. You can find me on the following socials.

HAND STITCHED

There are so many different ways of embellishing and adding to fabrics with hand stitching, this month we will explore a few of them in this magazine.

APPLIQUE

Applique is a method used for adding decorative elements to garments and household textiles. It is an effective way of covering holes.

Fabric shapes are cut out and stabilized with iron-on backing and stitched onto existing fabrics to create pictures. They are usually edged with a blanket stitch.



BORO

Wikipedia says..."Boro (ぼろ) are a class of <u>Japanese</u> textiles that have been mended or patched together."



EMBROIDERY

Embroidery is a method of adding decorative elements to fabrics using colorful threads. Flowers are a popular design feature.

The embroidery can be purely decorative or it can be used for visible mending.



PATCHWORK

Patchwork is a way of creating new fabrics from small pieces of scrap fabrics. They are stitched together and will often be stabilized by a solid backing cloth of some kind.



SASHIKO

Wikipedia says..."Sashiko (刺し子, lit. 'little stabs') is a type of traditional <u>Japanese</u> <u>embroidery</u> or <u>stitching</u> used for the decorative and/or functional reinforcement of cloth and clothing."



FabMo is an volunteer-run non-profit that started when an environmentally-conscious couple learned how much fabric mostly various-sized upholstery and drapery samples - were discarded every week at the San Francisco Design Center. They arranged to go up to San Francisco from their home in the South Bay to pick up these garbage bags of unwanted samples from various studios. That grew as more and more firms learned that they could save money by donating these materials instead of having them hauled away as trash. Word spread and they began to be offered mill-ends and fabrics still on the roll, wallpaper & tile samples, cones of thread, yarn stashes and various other craft supplies. Where does all this go? It goes to sewists, quilters, paper-crafters, mixed-media artists, school teachers, needleworkers, costumers - you name it! - through a regular schedule of 3-day sale events where you can buy supplies at pennies on the dollar. FabMo also has an online store where some of the most intriguing fabrics, yarns, etc. are offered first, though you must live close enough to the warehouse in Sunnyvale, CA, to pick up your purchases (or have a friend who can do it for you.) It's a wonderful group of people, and a fun and fascinating place to volunteer.






